Macrophages talk to enterocytes in vitro

Writing in the October issue of the **Journal of Anatomy**, Anatomical Society Research Student Siobhan Moyes and co-workers found that when Caco-2 cells are grown in an enterocyte-like monolayer in functional association with a compartmentally separate macrophage culture population, transepithelial resistance in the monolayer reduces and uptake of microparticulates increases. HRT reduces muscle loss in aging twins

Monozygotic female twins aged over 50years have provided us with the latest insight into the role of oestrogen in aging-associated loss in muscle tissue. Paula Ronkainen and colleagues have just reported their findings from studies which show that hormone replacement therapy improves muscle tissue during ageing by, among other things, orchestrating a switch from glucose-oriented metabolism to fatty acid utilisation.
