

Did you know that aquatic mammals have relatively large, complex respiratory turbinates and greatly reduced olfactory turbinates compared with terrestrial species? Blaire Van Valkenburgh and her colleagues discuss how increased respiratory surface area likely evolved to minimize heat loss, while olfactory surface area probably diminished due to a decreased reliance on olfaction when foraging under water.
