Draining the breast to the nodes

Evan Blumgart and colleagues at the Universities of Auckland and Sydney have examined widely held anatomical assumptions regarding lymphatic drainage patterns of the breast including symmetry, tumor prevalence and node field drainage in their paper published in the **June issue** of the **Journal of Anatomy**. Is Diabetes related to Alzheimer's disease?

Can diabetics suffer from Alzheimer's disease? Do Alzheimer's patients develop diabetes? In the paper published in the current issue of Aging Cell, Pasquale Picone and colleagues at the University of Palermo, Italy show that Akt-mediated insulin signalling protects cells by antagonizing the cell death process that is associated with beta-amyloid. Fears of small universities confirmed in HEIF allocations

Pleas from smaller universities to revise proposed changes to the Higher Education Innovation Fund have been ignored, with 31 institutions set to lose their funding following an announcement of allocations last week. The Higher Education Funding Council for England confirmed that universities must now reach a threshold of minimum levels of "innovation activity", such as contract research and intellectual property, to get HEIF funding.
