The STFC's Education, Training and Careers Committee have made recommendations on the allocations of forthcoming PhD studentships in light of the comprehensive spending review; favouring university departments which have a proven record of completion within 4 years. Allocations will drop by 10% for departments with 50-69% completion, and will be reduced by 20% for departments with less than 50% completion.
