The Symington Bequest Award Reports

This month we received three reports from recipients of the Symington Bequest Award.

Dr. Kieran McDermott of University College Cork reports on his recent participation at the 10th European Meeting on Glial cells in Health and Disease, in Prague 13-17 September 2011. Dr. McDermott presented work entitled 'Cell Specific labelling and time-lapse imaging of neuroepithelial progenitor cells in the developing spinal cord.' This meeting represents the primary international gathering for researchers active in the field of glial cell biology and glial-neuronal interactions.

Dr. Simon Parson of Edinburgh University reported on his 3rd attendance at the SMA-UK Researcher's Conference in Oxford 3-4 October 2011, where he presented novel work documenting that 'Skeletal muscle microvasculature is altered in a server model of Spinal Muscular Atrophy.' Dr. Parson highlights some of the recent research on SMA discussed at the meeting as well as the requirement for more basic research to support the development of treatment strategies.

Dr. Kerry Thompson of the National University of Ireland, Galway reports on her participation at the 7th International Meeting on Rapid Responses to Steroidal Hormones, in Crete 14-17 September 2011 where she presented work on 'Rapid alterations in the cytoskeletal structure of human endometrial cells in response to treatment with the steroid hormone 17 Oestradiol and the synthetic oestrogen diethylstilbestrol (DES).'

MRI of the human foetal cerebellum

In this month's issue of the Journal of Anatomy Fei Liu and colleagues investigated the characteristics of normal cerebellar development in foetuses of 14 to 22 weeks gestation using 7.0T MRI. Morphological parameters of the foetal cerebellum analysed included cerebellar volume, transverse cerebellar diameter and length and width of the vermis. The authors conclude that MRI can clearly demonstrate the trajectory of cerebellar development thus facilitating the diagnosis of pathological intrauterine changes in the cerebellum. Mitochondrial DNA and the short-lived turguoise killifish

The turquoise killifish Nothobranchius furzeri not only has an exceptionally short lifespan of 3–8 months but also demonstrates typical signs of aging making it an ideal model for aging research. Nils Hartmann and colleagues report in the October issue of Aging Cell that aging in N. furzeri is associated with a decline in mitochondrial DNA (mtDNA) copy number, downregulation of mtDNA and an impairment of mitochondrial function.
