Follow the lymph vessels

Sagrario Ortega at the Spanish National Cancer Research Centre in Madrid and her colleagues genetically engineered a mouse to express a luminescent protein under the control of the gene Vegfr3, a lymphatic marker. The team imaged live mice, tracking vessel growth during embryo development, wound healing and inflammation.
