Journal of Anatomy: human hands and fish fins

How similar are humans and tetrapods to fish? Well, human arms and leas are comparable to the fins in fish. The evidence is examined, from an evolutionary standpoint, in a paper by Emily Don and colleagues in the January issue of the Journal of Anatomy. Aging Cell: growing old and losing fatty cells

As we grow older, our sensitivity to insulin decreases, and the number of brown adipocytes reduce in number leaving mostly white adipose tissue. The white adipose tissue promotes progression towards insulin resistance. In this fascinating paper on brown fat and insulin resistance in aging rodents, Nicole Rogers and colleagues describe experimental evidence that presents loss of browning in white fat as a new age-related facet of metabolic disease.
