

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Symington Bequest Award – Report

Stomach-to-mouth or mouth-to-stomach?

Franscesco Loy and colleagues have revealed an infringing finding in the human parotid gland: the serous acinar cells carry receptors for gastrin and the peptide is able to evoke secretion by these cells. The findings raise interesting questions about insertion of K+/H+ ATPase pumps into the cell membranes of these cells: is gastric acid secretion accompanied by salivation? Stay alert and live longer

They live 7-10 times longer and do not show any aging effects for three-quarters of their lives. And no, this is not about cosmetic surgery patients. In the April issue of the journal **Aging Cell**, **Yael Edrey and colleagues** describe their investigation of the role of neuregulin-1 (NRG-1) in the longevity of naked mole-rats. NRG-1 is an important regulator of brain function: so does this mean that one will not grow old as long as the brain continues to function? Does deterioration in brain function make one grow old faster? Find out more at
