Journal of Anatomy: menisci woven like a reed basket

Did you know that the fibres in the meniscus at the knee are woven a bit like a basket? Stephen Andrews and colleagues at universities of Alberta and Calgary in Canada report their study of the spatial relationship between the radial and circumferential collagen fibres in the meniscus. Aging Cell: could muscle atrophy in aging be collateral damage?

Huijuan Wang and colleagues at universities and research institutes in France and Singapore present a fascinating insight into the extent of apoptotic self-involvement among the various cell populations in muscle. Their evidence suggests a greater contribution from non-myofibre components in muscle.
